ARTICLE V - MEMBERSHIP

Section 1. GENERAL

Members are considered to be in good standing, if National and Local dues have been paid for the current year. Members not paid shall be considered terminated from USSVI and/or Charleston Base when dropped from the National database.**

Mike Emerson Made a motion to table this By law Change until the next meeting.

There was a unanimous voice vote to table.

2. BASE VICE-COMMANDER

A. Assists the Base Commander in the performance of his duties.

B. Presides over all meetings and assumes the duties of Base Commander if Base Commander is unavailable or incapacitated.

C. When possible, and in the event the Base Commander is unavailable, represent the Base at SE Regional conventions. Two nights lodging will be authorized from the general fund.

Proposed: add

D. Serves as Special Events Coordinator.

There is no cost to the base of this amendment.

Justification: Reflects the current situation and gives the Vice-Commander a duty in order to use his talents other than just to be a stand-by.

Justification: The Tax exempt status comes from USSVI and the Base Treasurer has no input in the status.

Original.:

ARTICLE XV – AMENDMENTS

Section 1. Any member in good standing may submit bylaw amendment proposals to an elected officer in person or by mail.

Section 2. A revision(s) must refer to the affected bylaw section and must be clear, concise and organized, complete with financial repercussions. If revision is submitted by mail, the author shall sign it.

Section 3. Revisions shall be transmitted to the general membership two (2) weeks prior to a regular monthly meeting where a majority vote will be required for adoption. The Base Commander shall inform all members of the proposed revision(s) via the meeting notice announcing time and place. Revision(s) adopted shall become effective at the close of the meeting.

Section 4. Charleston Base bylaws will be reviewed annually during the month of January or as required by the BOD. The Base Commander will appoint two (2) or more base members to assist him in conducting the review.

Proposed:

Section 3. **Revisions shall undergo a technical review by the Board of Directors to ensure the amendment is not of a frivolous nature and the wording is precise.**

Any recommended changes to the wording must be approved by the member submitting the amendment.

Revisions shall be transmitted to the general membership **at least** two (2) weeks prior to a regular monthly meeting **within two**

months of the original submission where a majority

vote will be required for adoption. The Base

Commander shall inform all members of the proposed revision(s) via the meeting notice announcing time and

place. Revision(s) adopted shall become effective at the close of the meeting.

There is no cost to the base of this amendment.

Justification: This provides timeliness in acting on ByLaw changes as well as a technical review by the BOD.

This measure passed on a voice vote.

Article XVII –Dissolution

Section 1

In the event the Charleston Base dissolves, all assets and monies will be donated to a non-profit organization as determined by the board of Directors.

This Article is not in accordance with Charleston Base Bylaw Article III, Section 1 which states that the Charleston Base shall adopt no policy in conflict with the laws and practices of the United States Government or with the National Constitution and Bylaws of the USSVI.

Per the UNITED STATES SUBMARINE VETERANS INC CONSTITUTION

Article XVI Dissolution Article 3

In the event of a Base, District or regional Dissolution, all assets and monies of the same shall be turned over to the National Senior Vice Commander.

Recommended that XVII Dissolution section 1.Be reviewed to read: In the event the Charleston Base Dissolves, all assets and monies of the same be turned over to the National Senior Vice Commander.

Kaps 4 Kids Presentation

On April 5th, 5 members of the United States Submarine Veterans, Inc, Charleston Base visited the children's wing of the McLeod Regional Medical Center in Florence, SC. The trip was arranged by Bill "Friar Tuck" Kennedy and his daughter Sarah Rolan, Director of Nursing. Those visiting were Bill Kennedy, Rick Sparger, Ed Stank, Ken Hutchison and Bill Hayes. The group was escorted by Allana Hilley, a Child Life Specialist and visited about 15 children ranging in age from a new born to 15 years old. Each child were presented with a "Kaps for Kids" honorary submariner certificate, ball cap, coloring books and crayons.

Since 1992, a specially designated Children's Hospital Ambulance has transported children and newborns

from community hospitals throughout the region to high-tech, lifesaving specialists at the Children's Hospital. In 1994, McLeod opened the region's only five-bed Pediatric Intensive Care Unit (PICU) - designed, staffed and equipped, especially for children. In 1997, the PICU was upgraded from a five-bed unit to a six-bed unit and is currently under the direction of three board-certified pediatric intensivists.

Today, nearly 100 beds at McLeod are dedicated to serving the needs of children, including those in the Children's Hospital, Neonatal Intensive Care Unit, PICU, and Day Hospital.

The McLeod Pediatric Critical Care group was established in 1992. McLeod currently has six pediatric subspecialists encompassing the subspecialties of pediatric cardiology, pediatric critical care, pediatric endocrinology, pediatric neurology, pediatric general surgery and pediatric orthopedic surgery. In addition, McLeod is joined by a satellite clinic from the Medical University of South Carolina in the field of pediatric pulmonology.

The Children's Hospital is an institutional member of the Association for the Care of Children's Health, the South Carolina Children's Hospital Collaborative, and Children's Miracle Network Hospitals.

McLeod Children's Hospital is one of 170 Children's Hospitals in North America that Comprise the Children's Miracle Network Hospitals. The Children's Miracle Network Hospitals (CMNH), a non-profit organization, is dedicated to helping children by raising funds and awareness for affiliate hospitals. Each year, these non-profit hospitals treat more than 17 million children afflicted with diseases, injuries and birth defects of every kind. A hallmark of CMNH is that 100 percent of every dollar raised in a community stays there to help children in need.

Eight Things To Know About U.S. Navy's First Submarine

Test your knowledge about USS Holland (SS 1) with these eight things that you may not know from U.S. Naval History and Heritage Command:

1. The first commissioned submarine accepted by the U.S. Navy, USS Holland (SS 1), was designed by John Philip Holland. In 1875, his first submarine designs were submitted for consideration by the Navy, but turned down as unworkable.
2. Holland continued to improve his designs and worked on several experimental boats prior to his successful efforts with the privately built Holland launched in 1898. This was the first submarine having power to run submerged for any considerable distance. She was purchased by the Navy after rigorous tests, and six more of her type were ordered.
3. The first Holland was launched by Crescent Shipyards, Elizabeth, N.J., in 1898.
4. It was commissioned Oct. 12, 1900, with Lt. Harry H. Caldwell in command.
5. On Oct. 16, 1900, Holland left Newport under tow of tug Leyden for Annapolis where she trained Naval Academy midshipmen as well as officers and enlisted Sailors ordered there to receive training in preparing for the operation of other submarines being built for the Fleet.
6. Holland proved valuable for experimental purposes in collecting data for submarines under construction or contemplation. Her 166-mile surface run from Annapolis to Norfolk, Jan. 8-10, 1901, provided useful data on her performance underway over an extended period.
7. Except for the period from June 15 to Oct. 1, 1901, which was passed training personnel at the Naval Torpedo Station, Newport, R.I., Holland remained at Annapolis until July 17, 1905, as a training submarine.
8. Holland finished out her career at Norfolk. Her name was struck from the Navy Register of Ships, Nov. 21, 1910.

Navy Proposes To Accelerate Attack Submarine Construction

The Navy has formally proposed to increase yearly construction of Virginia-class submarines starting in the 2020s.

The Navy is now formally proposing to build one more Virginia-class attack submarine per year by the early 2020s, above and beyond what is now planned, service officials told Scout Warrior.

Navy officials have begun to work on the proposed plan, to be articulated in the service's 2018 five-year spending plan called a Program Objective Memorandum, or POM.

The current status-quo effort to build two Virginia-Class boat per year, however, will drop to one as construction of the Ohio Replacement Program, or ORP, begins in the early 2020s.

The possibility now being proposed is to, at this future point in time, have Navy and industry produce two Virginia-Class boats and one Ohio Replacement submarine per year, increasing the current plan by one Virginia-Class boat per year.

Navy leaders have consistently talked about an expected submarine shortfall in the mid 2020s and that more attack submarines were needed to strengthen the fleet and keep stay in front of near-peer rivals such as Russia and China.

The Navy, naturally, seeks to maintain its considerable technological advantage in the undersea domain, something which could increasingly be challenged in coming years. Virginia-class technology, including quieting abilities, Large Aperture Bow sonar and increased Tomahawk firepower with the upcoming integration of Virginia Payload Modules -- can likely help Navy submarines challenge or overcome anti-access/area-denial challenges posed by potential adversaries.

The Virginia Payload Modules, to come in future years, will increase the Tomahawk missile firepower of the submarines from 12 missiles up to 40. This is scheduled to start happening as the Ohio-class guided missile submarines begin to retire.

Increasing production hinges on whether the submarine-building industry has the capacity to move up to three submarines per year, Navy and Congressional sources have said.

Current budget constraints and industrial base capacity limitations may make building three submarines per year too difficult to accomplish, even if the desire to do so was there from both Congressional and Navy leaders.

While Navy officials, including Navy Acquisition Executive Sean Stackley, did tell lawmakers on the House Armed Services Committee Sea Power and Projection Force Subcommittee, production changes could emerge in the future, depending upon funding and industrial base capabilities.

Stackley explained that the service would like to maintain a two per-year production schedule for Virginia-Class attack submarines, even after production of the ORP begins.

"We are working today, and we hope and expect you to work with us, to determine how can we keep two Virginias a year proceeding within all the fiscal constraints and within the limitations of the industrial base, to address this compelling requirement for the nation," Stackley told lawmakers.

The Virginia-Class Submarines are built by a cooperative arrangement between the Navy and Electric Boat, a subsidiary of General Dynamics and Newport News Shipbuilding, a division of Huntington Ingalls Industries.

Each industry partner constructs portions or "modules" of the submarines which are then melded together to make a complete vessel, industry and Navy officials explained.

In the past, various sub-building industry executives have indicated that this might be possible, however such a prospect has not yet been formally confirmed as it would likely involve an increase in resources, funds and man-power.

One industry source told Scout Warrior that the submarine building community would support whatever the

Navy and Congress call for.

"We'll support Navy programs," the source said.
